This template can be used for multiple purposes:

 It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

The school will continue to be involved in High Peak Sports Partnership and Glossopdale cluster opportunities into the next academic year, providing children with the opportunity to enjoy being active and taking part in a range of competitive sports.

The school will continue to contribute towards the cost of PE and Sport clubs-Active Tameside Dance and Gymnastics.

The Playground Leader training will be available for pupils in Year 5 next academic year. Last year's Year 5 pupils, now Year 6, will support in leading games at lunchtime, as the school is no longer using the provision of OTIS.



Key Indicator 3: The role of PE and sport is raised across the whole school as a tool for whole school improvement.

The role of PE and sport continues to be a priority within the school and has a high profile. Importance of PE and sport in helping them planned into the school's curriculum. The large majority of these pupils do not access swimming lessons out of school and were non-swimmers on starting in Year 4.
